PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Day-Trek is a base camp adventure for both the novice and the experienced. Whitewater on the Youghiogheny, hiking at the Ohiopyle, mountain biking on the Great Allegheny Passage Trail, caving and climbing at Laurel Caverns and boardsailing on Lake Courage. Evning programs will include swimming, fishing, COPE, waterskiing and kayaking. All the program and camping gear except your sleeping bag and personal items and clothing are provided. Earn the 50-Miler award, learn about Leave No Trace, wilderness camping, trail cooking, map & compass as well as GPS navigation. Coed groups of 12 built from one unit or several will each have a trained and certified Trek Guide with them for the week and each needs to. Coed groups will need a male and female 21 year old.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Heritage Reservation

- When will the guidebook and advancement schedule be available?
 - The guidebook and advancement schedules will be available late February.
- Are advancements earned at camp included in the price of camp?
 - The materials for the work are provided in the camp fee. Some of the actual awards can be purchased in out trading post and all can be purchased at the Scout Shop in Flag Plaza or the Ebensburg Service Center.
- Can we purchase the advancement pieces at camp?
 - Some of the actual awards can be purchased in our trading post and all can be purchased at the Pittsburgh Scout Shop.
- Can I use my Jamboree Health and Medical Record for summer camp?
 - Yes a Jamboree Health and Medical Record can be used in the Jamboree year.
- Can I register after my unit has paid for camp?
 - We endeavor to support every Scout in attending camp. Late additions can be made to the unit roster up until one week prior to camp pending availability.
- What are the procedures for problems/emergencies?
 - Our staff leaders are trained at National Camping School in how to deal with emergencies and other problems. The entire staff reviews plans for possible emergencies during staff training. We also work closely with local authorities and emergency services as needed.
- How do I apply for a campership? When is it due? When will we find out? Can that fee be transferred to someone else?
 - o Campership forms are available on our website. Applications are due April 1. Awards will be announced in early May. Camperships are not transferable.
- How can I learn more about our Online Registration System (DoubleKnot)?
 - We will offer a brief training at our Camp Leader meetings in February. Otherwise you are welcome to call Mollie Gray at 412-325-7921 for assistance.
- What kind of medical do I need for each session?

All campers must utilize the Annual Health and Medical Record # 680-001 2012 Printing.

- o Campers staying less than 72 hours must complete parts A and B.
- o Campers staying 72 hours or more must complete parts A, B and C. This requires a doctor's examination within 12 months of attendance at camp.
- If I can only attend for a partial session, what is the cost?
 - o All youth fees are based on attending for the full session.
 - Parents and leaders should share weeks to fill that space all week. To better
 accommodate adults work schedules we do have an adult daily rate of \$25 for those that
 cannot share a week with another adult.
- How do I get a refund?
 - o Refund forms are available on the website and have specific deadlines and requirements.
- What training do leaders need to have to go to camp?
 - Someone in each unit is required to have Youth Protection and Risk Zone training.
- How do I take a pre-camp swim test?
 - o Instructions are available in the guidebook as well as on the Heritage Website. This is encouraged as it will save your unit valuable time during check-in.
- What is the registration cut-off?
 - We endeavor to support every Scout in attending camp. Late additions can be made to the unit roster up until one week prior to camp pending availability.



Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Heritage Reservation (continued)

- Can I call in a registration if I cannot get the online system to work?
 - o Yes call Mollie Gray on 412-325-7921 and she can assist you in with your registration.
- I have a special dietary request/necessity, how can that be accommodated?
 - There is an online form to submit this request. Our food service vendor will follow up with each case. We will do everything we can to meet your health needs however in extreme cases it may be necessary for you to provide your own food. Due to the large volume of campers we cannot accommodate requests that are not due to health issues.
- What does the camp fee cover? Are there any additional fees?
 - o The camp fees cover all program supplies, meals and lodging. All program surcharges for things like Basketry, Shotgun or high adventure have been eliminated.
- How much money will my campership be for?
 - Camperships depend on available money from the Campership Fund as well as the number of qualified applicants and the length of stay. Last year camperships ranged from \$10 to \$95.
- If a parent/leader is only coming overnight, do they need to bring a medical?
 - o All overnight campers are required to have an Annual Health and Medical Record on file with camp. In this case being less than 72 hours it would require parts A and B.
- Do parents have to be registered leaders to attend?
 - o No, but it is required that each unit has at least one registered leader in attendance.
- Can I bring my own tent?
 - o Yes



Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Camp Independence

Can Webelos attend Cub Scout Camp or vice versa?

 Each camp is geared toward that specific age range and will have activities and advancement particular to those ranks. Webelos attending a Cub Scout camp will likely be bored with the program.

• What if a parent can't take the whole time off?

We encourage parents and leaders to rotate with other parents and leaders, each of which goes to camp part of the week. We recommend a ratio of 1 adult for every 5 scouts.

Can I attend at a different time than the rest of my Pack/Den?

 Absolutely. Individual parent/son teams or parts of dens or packs may register for the session that best fits their schedule pending availability. Last year there was a pack that had Scouts at five different sessions.

• Where do we sleep and eat?

- Campers choose one of eight campsites and stay in canvas platform tents with cots and have latrines and hot showers nearby.
- All meals except for the campsite cookout for the Webelos are taken in the dining hall and are prepared by a professional cooking staff.

• Can a brother of a Cub Scout go to Camp Independence?

 All youth participants must be registered Scouts. Camp is not outfitted to support siblings who are not registered.

• Can adults stay over between sessions of camp?

Yes, but you will need to call ahead to make arrangements.

• Can a Webelos crossing over attend Camp Independence one last time?

No, the activities at Camp Independence are specifically tailored for the age of Webelos. He would have much more fun at one of the Boy Scout camps with the troop he is now a member of.

Do I need BALOO training to come to summer camp?

BALOO is required for pack specific camping. Attendance at Council camps like summer camp at Heritage/Independence does not require this.

• What is advancement time?

o This is scheduled time where Scouts choose what they want to work on. We offer Sports and Academic belt loops, Webelos Activity Badges and several other awards.

• What is in the foil cooking meal? Do I need to bring anything?

- The final menu for all meals will be posted on the website in May.
- A recommended list can be found in the guidebook.
- o Extra tinfoil, hot pads, tongs, paring knife, cutting board, utensils, cups, plates

• What if I don't want to go to Nature? Can I do something else?

 The camp program is written with several things in mind. Our goal is to offer a wide variety of programs for each Scout. Camp also has up to 500 campers each session and for this reason we need to schedule where campers are so areas do not get overwhelmed.



Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Camp Liberty / Camp Freedom

• Do we still get free Adults?

o For each six paid Scouts a unit will earn one free adult.

• When are payments due?

- o \$10 reservation fee per person is due with your registration.
- o \$25 additionally is due April 1
- o Final payments are due May 15. If paid on time you get a \$10 discount per camper.

What if I can't go when my troop is going?

We have provisional camping at both Liberty and Freedom during week 3 and week 8.
 This is where we build a troop of boys from several troops. If a parent can go with you they can help serve as one of the provisional leaders for that week. Our first two provisional leaders for each week attend free.

• Where do we sleep and eat?

Troops choose one of fourteen campsites and stay in canvas platform tents with cots and have latrines and hot showers nearby. At Camp Freedom, all meals except for the campsite cookout are taken in the dining hall and are prepared by a professional cooking staff. At Camp Liberty, we have patrol cooking. You pick up the ingredients at the commissary and as a patrol cook the meals in your campsite.

• Is there something for older Scouts to do?

 Yes – there are more than 60 opportunities for merit badges, ranks and awards as well as Discovery Outpost. Or you can check out Eagle Base for our high adventure programs for Scouts 14 and older.

• How do I learn more about the high adventure opportunities?

- We will have a separate presentation for the Scouts who will be 14 and older.
- Check in the guidebook or our website http://www.LHC-BSA.org/Camping

What do you recommend for the first year campers?

We have a great program at Braddock's Brigade helps Scouts work on the basic Scout Skills in Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class. Scouts have time to take a merit badge or two as well. We suggest Basketry, Mammal Study, Leatherwork and Fingerprinting.

Can I get a discount if I am going to more than one camp session?

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Eagle Base – High Adventure

• Do we still get free Adults?

o For each six paid Scouts/Venturers a unit will earn one free adult.

• When are payments due?

- o \$25 reservation fee per person is due with your registration.
- o \$25 Early Bird Fee is due April 1 and entitles you to a free early bird patch and hat.
- o Final payments are due May 15. If paid on time you get a \$10 discount per camper.

• Where can I get a detailed schedule of the activities offered?

o Visit our website, http://www.LHC-BSA.org/Camping to learn more program specifics.

• Can we still participate in the programs at Camp Liberty and Freedom?

These programs are separate and most times off site from Camp Liberty and Freedom.
 However, you can also attend Camp Freedom or Liberty a different week than you go on
 a high adventure. If you go on Micro-Trek and are to be called out for the OA we can
 coordinate that.

• What if my troop or crew is not going?

Grab a buddy or go yourself as a provisional camper. We will match you up with other campers and by the end of the week you will have 11 new friends.

• Where do we sleep and eat?

For each of the adventures you will be provided with a trail tent that you will share with another tent mate. Micro-Trek will camp at Valley Forge. Food will be prepared by you and your crew with trail cooking equipment.

• Is there any age or other requirements for the high adventures?

 Yes, participants must be 14 years old and a registered Venturer or Boy Scout. Also Micro-Trek participants must be able to complete the BSA Swimmer Test and experience in boating is encouraged.

• Is there something we should do in preparation for our adventure?

This will be published in the leader guidebook and on the website and is specific to each activity.

Can our unit take all 12 spots of an adventure?

o Absolutely – as long as there are 12 spots available when you register

• How many adults are required?

- o One 21+ adult per unit represented, and two per crew of 12.
- o Male youth participants require a male 21+ adult.
- o Female youth participants require a female 21+ adult.

Are there separated accommodations for leaders of opposite sexes on the Micro-Trek?

- o Adults will sleep in separate tents than youth.
- o Males will sleep in separate tents than females.
- o The only exceptions to this are: a married couple or a parent with his/her own child.

What is the name of the high adventure base?

o Eagle Base, a revival of the original base for Explorers.

Can I get a discount if I am going to more than one camp session?

For those that attend another week long Scout camp, we do offer \$100 off of Eagle Base high adventure programs.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Camp Seph Mack – Cub Scouts

- Can a sibling of a Cub Scout go to Camp Seph Mack? All youth participants must be registered Scouts. Camp is not outfitted to support siblings who are not registered.
- Can a Webelos crossing over attend one last time? No, the activities at Camp Seph Mack are specifically tailored for the age of Webelos and Cub Scouts. He would have much more fun at one of the Boy Scout camps with the troop he is now a member of.
- Where do we sleep and eat? Campers choose one of several campsites and stay in canvas platform tents with cots (bring a mat) and have latrines and hot showers nearby. All meals with the exception of the Family Picnic are taken in the dining hall and are prepared by a professional cooking staff.
- Can Webelos and Cub Scouts attend together? Yes, At Camp Seph Mack we tailor the program to both age groups with activities and advancement particular to those ranks.
- What if I don't want to go to Nature? Can I do something else? The camp program is written with several things in mind. Our goal is to offer a wide variety of programs for each Scout. Camp also has up to 160 campers and we need to schedule where campers are so areas do not get overwhelmed.

EARLY BIRD HAT

- Each Scout paying his Early Bird Fee by April 1st will receive a free Heritage Reservation Hat.
- Scouts added after the Early Bird date and adults added before or after can purchase the hat for \$5.
- Units can choose to customize their hats for \$5 per hat.
 - o Unit and Number
 - City and State
- A form will be available online to order your hats.
- Delivery of hats will be made at camp
- Hats must be ordered by April 15th to ensure delivery and customization

\$50 CAMPERSHIP

- One \$50 LHC Campership will be awarded at each presentation conducted by our trained team between October 1 and April 30.
- Presenters need to collect the name of the Scout receiving this.
- Suggestion is to have each Scout put his/her name in a hat and draw from there.

2013 Summer Camp Fees (Approved 3/31/2012)

The Camping and Outdoor Program Committee will continue to use a sliding, all-in-one camp fee for 2013 to encourage a greater percentage of our youth and adults to commit early to camp and provide our camps with the ability to offer an even better program at a competitive rate by:

- · Confirming camps are not overbooked
- · Adjusting staffing and class offerings as necessary where increases in campers dictate
- Ensuring sufficient supplies are in camp before the season opens
- Purchasing supplies in advance and in bulk, with mail order and negotiation

The All-In-One concept means that regardless which program a youth selects he pays the same fee as each youth at that program. The practice of additional fees for merit badges, activities or out of council Scouts was eliminated. To support our camping programs there are several incentives that we will offer in 2013:

- \$100 off second full week of camp at our Laurel Highlands Council camps, prorated for Cub resident camps and adults.
- \$50 Promotion Credit for units utilizing our trained Camp Promotion Team.
- \$100 Trading Post Certificate for nominating a newly selected staff member or Counselor in Training.
- Bring another unit of at least 10 youth and save \$40 per youth in your own unit.
- Late Webelos Crossovers and New Scouts will still be exempt from the late registration fees.
- The Cap Program at Heritage and Seph Mack will be continued with two completely redesigned caps and every full session camper, youth and adult, will get a free cap. Units will still have the option to customize them for \$5 each.

The proposed fee structure is an increase of \$10- \$15 per camper for each of our programs. This supports increased costs associated with food, staffing, program supplies and more.
